

Disability Services: An Overview

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Academic Accommodations

- There is a legal duty to accommodate persons with disabilities in accordance with the BC Human Rights Code and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedom.
- In the context of UBC, this means that students with disabilities are entitled to equal access to education and equal opportunity for success. This may involve the provision of Academic Accommodations.
- The purpose of an Academic Accommodation is to put a person with a disability on an equal footing with someone who does not have a disability.
- Academic Accommodations do not compromise academic standards and a student receiving Academic Accommodation still has to fulfill the essential learning outcomes of the academic program.



Policy 73

- UBC Policy 73: Academic Accommodation for Students with Disabilities delegates the authority for determining and facilitating academic accommodations to A&D. This appures:
 - Consistent evaluation and decision-making regarding a student's disability and accommodations across the entire campus; and
 - Confidentiality of the student's information regarding their disability.



Disability Services

- Determines and facilitates Academic Accommodations for approximately 1800 students on campus.
- Reviews medical documentation to determine Academic Concessions based on disability.
- Coordinates and proctors over 7,000 specialized exams for students with disabilities per academic year.
- Coordinates support services for students with disabilities (e.g., notetaking, tutoring services) employing over 1000 hourly student assistants annually.



Disability Services

Disability Services does not deal with:

- Short-term illnesses or injuries (i.e., issues of a duration shorter than a month). These fall within the jurisdiction of the individual faculty or instructors.
- Students requiring therapeutic support. Students with these issues may be referred to Counseling Services or Student Health Services.
- Behavioral or conduct issues. These issues should be referred to the faculty, Early Alert or, in extreme cases, to Campus Security.
- o Medical, psychological or psycho-educational testing.
- o Shuttling students with mobility-related disabilities.



Disability Definitions

Disabilities is an umbrella term, covering impairments, activity limitations, and participation restrictions. An impairment is a problem in body function or structure; an activity limitation is a difficulty encountered by an individual in executing a task or action; while a participation restriction is a problem experienced by an individual in involvement in life situations. Thus disability is a complex phenomenon, reflecting an interaction between features of a person's body and features of the society in which he or she lives.




Persons with disabilities are persons who:


- have a significant and persistent mobility, sensory, learning, or other physical or mental health impairment which may be permanent or temporary; AND
- o experience functional restrictions or limitations of their ability to perform the range of life's activities; AND
- may experience attitudinal and/or environmental barriers that hamper their full and self-directed participation in life.

Common Accommodations and Support Services

- o Extended time on exams.
- o Distraction-reduced or private space for exams.
- o Use of a computer for exams.
- Use of recording device in class or notetaking services.
- o Texts in alternate format.



Information for Instructors

- Students are responsible for presenting their Accommodation Letter to their instructors as soon as possible (preferably at the beginning of each term) and for making any necessary arrangements with their professors for accommodations that have to be implemented in the classroom.
- Students are not obligated to use academic accommodations and may decline to use them even after they have been assessed. This does not impact their eligibility to use the accommodations at later date. However, students still have to inform instructors that they are eligible for accommodations in a timely manner (in the middle of the final exam period is <u>not</u> considered timely!)



Information for Instructors

Instructors should not:

- Ask for specifics about a student's medical information or documentation. A student may disclose if they choose but it is the student's choice.
- o "Negotiate", substitute or modify accommodations. All accommodations must be based on medical documentation provided to A&D. If the instructor feels that an accommodation is not workable or compromises an essential learning outcome of the course, the instructor should contact the student's Primary Advisor. Likewise, if a student requests an accommodation not identified by A&D, the instructor should refer the student to their Primary Advisor or contact the advisor directly.



Exams

- When a student has exam accommodations one of two things can happen:
 - Their professor provides them with the accommodation; or
 - They register to write the exam through A&D.
- Students register for exams at A&D through our online booking system and must request an exam sitting:
 - At least one week prior to the exam for midterms and quizzes; and
 - At least one week prior to the start of the formal exam period for final exams.



Exams

- Instructors will be contacted by email one week prior to the exam and prompted to:
 - Log in to the Exam Booking System within 48 hours and confirm the time, date and duration of the exam and provide details on how to administer the exam:
 - Provide us with a copy of the exam at least two days before the exam (or at least one week before if the exam has to be converted to Braille)
 - Select how they want the exam delivered back to them.



Exams

- Any special arrangements for exams (e.g., slide shows, dictation, group components, etc.) should be communicated to A&D as early as possible.
